2026_02_01: Apologies

Apologies were received from district councillor Natalie Gist and were **accepted**.

2026_02_02: Acceptance of Minutes of Previous Meeting

The Minutes of the Ordinary meeting held on 19 January 2026 (already circulated) were considered and the **minutes were agreed** (proposed by Councillor Parkes and seconded by Councillor Briscoe).

Martin Birch declared an interest in the Merrie Men; David Johnson declared an interest in the bowls club and Jon Dutton and Roly Whear declared interest in allotments.

2026_02_06: Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

1. Dog fouling: Thompson Fields has a new sign. The composition and means of securing signs were discussed. Laminated are more durable than paper but not permanent. Some are tied with zip ties. Cllr Johnson volunteered to go round and put signs up himself if these are made available. **Action for clerk to contact Stratford official to send four signs through.**
2. Risk assessments: It was recommended councillors should try and complete them over the next month. Action: **clerk to send a reminder of everybody's area of responsibility.**
3. Salt bins at Compton locks. Highways have suggested a couple of locations. We need to clarify the latest situation with Cllr Gist.

2026_02_07: District Councillor and County Councillor Reports

Cllr Gist drew attention to a number of consultations including one on local government organisation. The proposal to split the county council in two was discussed. There were concerns about an unequal distribution of resources and that this might undermine local provision. **Cllr Dutton took the action to respond.**

There was no comment on the consultation about freehold and private estates.

Cllr Parkes volunteered to have a look at the five-year housing supply. The deadline is 9 March.

Cllr Whear volunteered to look at the local enforcement plan, in particular unplanned alterations in a protected zone. Deadline is 4 March.

(i) Lorries: Cllr Kettle said that he was pleased that the planning issue had been resolved and recommended that we respond to the County Council. Definitions of waste were discussed. Cllr Kettle observed that when topsoil is converted into another product it has to have a certificate. Councillors discussed this and the need to find out the source and composition of the material that is coming through the village. We also need to prove whether it is actually going to the site. It was noted that it would be hard to do this unless someone has physically followed a truck. The logistics of doing this were discussed. Cllr Whear asked whether the quarry could help given they must surely know how many lorries they've got going in and out. We need concrete proof that these lorries are going through Fenny and into the quarry. This will require a volunteer to go and sit outside the entrance with a clipboard. We would then need number plates, lorry brand names and a description of load. Cllr Briscoe thought this was not practical and Cllr Kettle said there was also the question of limited resource within the Council to deal with any data it provided. Cllr Dutton said the fact

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that lorries are coming in one way and leaving another makes it difficult to accurately assess traffic volume. The historic plan allowed for 10-11 lorries a day. Counting lorries will help show that lorries are coming in from Farnborough and leaving through Fenny and indicate that there are probably more lorries than the quarry have told us about. Action: Cllrs Whear and Dutton to work out how to capture evidence of traffic. Cllr Kettle also mentioned the need for any photographs to be date-stamped.

- (ii) Cllr Kettle drew councillors' attention to the budget discussions taking place the next day.
- (iii) Play area: Cracks have appeared on the fields. Cllr Whear has asked for some topsoil to fill them. Cllr Birch was asked about moving the container.
Cricket nets: Cllr Birch reported that last year a resident voluntarily restored the cricket nets and by the end of the summer a number of people were making use of them. The resident has now asked whether £800 could be made available for fake grass and indicated that he is prepared to contribute his own bowling machine. The Merrie Men have approved making an £800 grant but as they cannot claim back VAT it was suggested that if the parish council made the grant, we could claim back VAT and the Merrie Men will reimburse us. It was agreed this would be within our remit.
- (iv) (iv) Flood prevention: Cllr Whear has been liaising with WCC flooding team who now have an initial proposal for the additional pipe run from Ridge Way. Berry Meadow works have been successful in mitigating run off onto the Highway and flooding of gardens on Thompson Field. Aqueous are investigating whether further improvements can be made to better manage the run off from the garage side inspection chamber into the playing field.
- (v) Trees: We have a quote for removal of the goat willow at 2 Cotters Croft and are awaiting two further quotes as the first exceeded £500. **Action: councillors to suggest two further tree surgeons for this purpose to the clerk.**
- (vi) Highways: nothing to report.
- (vii) Bowls club: nothing to report.
- (viii) Village planters: prices being sourced by clerk.
- (ix) Street lights: no 4 and no 1 Avon Dasset Road are on all the time and the light by the old methodist church is not working at all. Action: **clerk to contact WCC to get all three checked.** Councillors discussed getting a quote to install more lights and Cllr Dutton volunteered to get a photo to support this.

Items to publicise: lorries. Call for volunteers; flooding: Berry Meadows is working correctly as a flood run off. It is the least bad option. The clerk requested that any items for inclusion on the noticeboards should be A5 not A4 in size as space is now very limited.

Council issues

Gritting

WCC grit 1,100 miles, 1,750 kms, each time they go out, and focus on all A and major B roads across the County as well as access routes into each village. On ungritted routes, where there are known hazards, grit bins, requested by PCs, are kept filled.

Private estates, with unadopted roads, are not included in gritting routes where responsibility for the roads remains with developers or their management companies. Regrettably Ropeway, on Bishops Hill, except for the first 50 metres, is not adopted. The PC needs to consider writing to the developer on behalf of residents to consider how they will address the issue of their icy roads.

Storm Goretta on the 8th Jan brought particularly challenging conditions, prompting the fitting of snow ploughs to gritters for the first time since the "Beast from the East" in February 2018. During the height of the storm, teams carried out four gritting runs within a 24-hour period at 1:00pm, 5:30pm, 9:00pm and 1:00am, using approximately 1,000 tonnes of salt to keep key routes open and safe.

The overall highways response to the storm involved a significant mobilisation of staff and resources. Over the week, the operation included 58 gritter drivers, 10 supervisors, 20 plough mates, two County Fleet Maintenance vehicle technicians, and a duty manager, contributing to around 2,200 person-hours of work. Additional day crews were deployed on Friday to maintain resilience as severe conditions continued.

Potholes

There has been a significant increase in potholes being reported across the County in January. This has been a national issue and whilst it's little consolation, Warwickshire hasn't suffered as much as many other parts of the country.

Whilst we've been lucky with milder winters over the last few years, the recent snow and ice has "blown" quite a

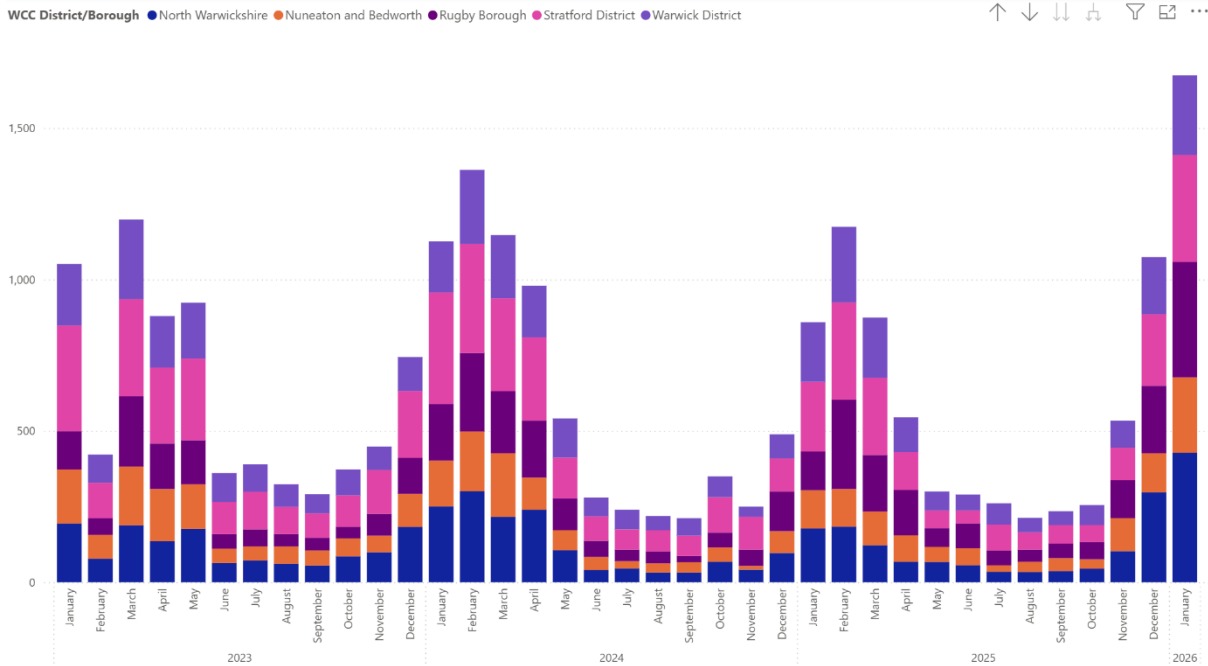
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few weak areas of our roads which are in the poorest condition so I'm sure you're feeling the frustration from your residents.

It's normal for an increase in potholes at this time of year, with the freeze-thaw action from frosts being the main reason for new potholes forming. The graph below show the reports that we have received from the public with a clear increase in each of the four most recent winters, it also shows a surge of reports following the frozen period, earlier in January 2026.

The recent very heavy rains have added further to the problem.



WCC's policy response times vary depending on severity from 2 hours for emergencies to 30 days for more minor potholes.

For an example of how quickly a pothole can form, this picture was taken from a public report which an area surveyor attended and issued a 30 day response to on Wednesday and by Thursday evening, this is what it looked like:



Discretionary highways budget

Hopefully this month, during half term, the Ladbroke Road pavement between the Greaves Club and the entrance to the school will be repaired under my Highways budget. Both the widening of the pavement along Station Road, Fenny Compton, and replacing the gully, redirecting the drain from a soakaway to the main and the infilling of the depression opposite the Church in Church Road are now recorded on the new IT system. I do not yet have a

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start date for either.

Hambridge

WCC received a report that the locks used by WCC to keep the gates on Hambridge Road open have been cut off and the gates left closed again. WCC will be taking further action to keep the road open.

Hambridge itself is still under repair. Owing to further extensive structural damage, caused by an HGV, removing barriers and crossing the closed bridge whilst earlier repairs were in progress, a much more major piece of work has had to be commissioned to make the bridge safe.

This has required a structural redesign to be undertaken and then approved before work can commence.

This is a top priority for WCC and I understand physical works are beginning this week.

Full Council 8th Feb 2026:

Full Council met, on Thursday to determine the budget for 26-27 and the Medium Term Financial Strategy.

The proposal from the Administration was to increase Council tax by 3.89% compared to the draft budget presented to Cabinet in January which was for an increase of 4.99%. As 2% of this increase is ringfenced for Adult Social care, this left an increase of 1.89% to fund any increase in the cost of all other services.

There was little material change in the proposed expenditure budget for 26/27 but with significant cuts proposed in expenditure vv the original budget in future years.

The S151 officer is required to comment on the Administration's budget proposals and his report included the following:

"The Council's financial risk profile will increase materially during 2026/27 and over the course of the five year period covered by the Medium-Term Financial Strategy (MTFS) due to the combined impact of the following factors:

- continuing levels of demand in children's and adults social care driving cost pressures in 2025/26 which are not fully funded in 2026/27 and are likely to deplete the short-term financial risk reserve significantly during 2026/27;
- the level of reserves and reduced cover for contingencies arising from a significant draw on reserves early in the MTFS, particularly the use of £10.0m from the medium-term financial strategy reserve (Balance = £17.4m) in year 1;
- the risks arising from the provision for future pressures being set lower than the recommended minimum level in years 2 and 3, which compounds the risks associated with the unfunded service pressures from 2025/26 and risks around pay, inflation and demand; and
- the recommendation to take less than the maximum available council tax increase of 4.99% permanently erodes the Council's financial base by £5.9m recurrently by Year 5 with a total loss of £26m revenue over the five years of the MTFS.

The SEND overspend continues to cause concern, with the cumulative overspend, which is "sort of" funded by a government policy "the statutory override", expected to reach £150 million by the end of this financial year.

The Administration's budget was rejected as were alternatives from each of the opposition groups.

Some hours were spent trying to achieve a compromise budget, led by the Conservative Group, and four of the five parties involved were prepared to change their budget demands to achieve that compromise.

This would have resulted in Reform's proposed Council tax increase in year one increasing to 4.5%, from 3.89% in year one and allow some additional expenditure from the proposed budgets of other parties.

This revised budget met all of the S151 officers concerns.

However at circa 8.00pm, whilst negotiations were still on-going, two groups, the LDs and the Green party, proposed an alternative budget with a 4.99% increase each year throughout the five years of the MTFS.

This was defeated.

We meet again tomorrow.

One major change is that, since the first meeting the Government has made a very significant offer to

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settle some 90% of the outstanding SEND liabilities. This changes the financial picture massively.

Appendix D

District Councillor's report

1. Local Government Re-organisation in Warwickshire

The government has launched a consultation to invite residents, businesses, and key stakeholders, to have their say as part of the consultation on what Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) should look like in Warwickshire.

Currently, Warwickshire has two-tiers of local government, Warwickshire County Council as one tier and five District and Borough Councils - North Warwickshire Borough, Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough, Rugby Borough, Stratford and Warwick District Councils as the second tier.

Local government reorganisation (LGR) is planned for Warwickshire because central government has set out a national policy to reorganise the current two-tier system of local government in England to one tier, and Warwickshire is one of the areas affected by that policy.

In line with the Local Authority Publicity Code, the councils are not promoting or advocating for any option within the consultation. The consultation is being led by Government, which is seeking views on the options that have been put forward.

The Government is only consulting on whether residents would prefer one unitary council for Warwickshire, or separate north and south unitary councils.

2. Private Management Companies

2.1 Enhanced protections for homeowners on freehold estates – Available here: [Enhanced protections for homeowners on freehold estates - GOV.UK](#)

As you may be aware, Government has regulated through the Leasehold and Freehold Act 2024 (which gained royal assent on 24 May 2024) to strengthen the rights of freehold homeowners on private and mixed-tenure estates in England give freeholders the right to:

- challenge unreasonable estate charges and the standard of work carried out through an application to a property tribunal
- apply to the tribunal to appoint a substitute manager where their estate management company is failing.
- improve the transparency of estate charges and ensure freehold homeowners receive key information on a regular basis.
- improve the transparency of administration charges and give freeholders the right to challenge unreasonable charges through an application to the tribunal.
- require estate managers to consult freeholders where the anticipated cost of major works exceeds a specified amount.
- require developers who do not employ a managing agent, as well as estate managers on freehold estates, to belong to a redress scheme.

The Act is in place now, but the majority of its provisions are not yet in force as they require detailed secondary legislation to be commenced.

On 18 December 2025, Government launched a consultation which seeks views on how to effectively implement the new regulatory framework in order to give effect to the above provisions of the Act. The consultation is focussed on the views of residents of estates in private management and the private management companies themselves. The consultation closes on 12 March 2026.

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2.2 Reducing the prevalence of private estate management arrangements – Available here: [Reducing the prevalence of private estate management arrangements - GOV.UK](#)

This consultation seeks views on proposals to:

- increase the adoption of estate amenities on new development, such as roads, drainage systems, and green spaces by public authorities
- introduce common standards for adoptable amenities
- consider mandatory adoption for certain public infrastructure
- remove financial incentives that make non-adoption attractive to developers
- improve transparency and data on estate management arrangements

The consultation also seeks evidence on the impacts for homeowners, housing developers, local authorities, and management companies.

Five Year Housing Land Supply

Stratford-on-Avon District Council has opened a public consultation on a draft Interim Policy Position Statement, as part of its approach to recovering a five-year land supply.

Being unable to demonstrate a five-year land supply has significant implications for the operation of planning policy. Under the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), key development plan policies relating to housing must be considered out of date, and the "presumption in favour of sustainable development" is applied in decision-making.

To address this, the District Council is implementing a comprehensive Housing Land Supply Action Plan, agreed by [Cabinet in October 2025](#), focused on boosting supply and recovering a five-year position as quickly as possible.

A key early action is the publication of a draft Interim Policy Position Statement, which sets out:

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- Which existing planning policies are now considered out of date.
- How national policy must be applied during this period.
- The implications for neighbourhood plans.
- The approach the District Council intends to take to encourage appropriate and deliverable housing proposals.

The District Council is now seeking views from residents, developers, parish councils, and other stakeholders before finalising the document.

The consultation is now open and will run until 5pm on Monday 9 March.

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HGVs

Grit bins at Compton Lockse

A resident of Compton Locks has also raised the lack of grit bins on the estate, and the danger on the roads there in cold weather. Natalie has been in touch with both Orbit and Highways. Orbit have agreed to place grit bins at Compton Locks provided that the responsibility for these is taken over once the roads are adopted. Highways have helpfully suggested two safe sites for the grit bins if the ongoing responsibility for them can be agreed. Natalie understands that the Parish Council will discuss this at their meeting this month and following their discussion, Natalie is more than happy to liaise with Orbit.

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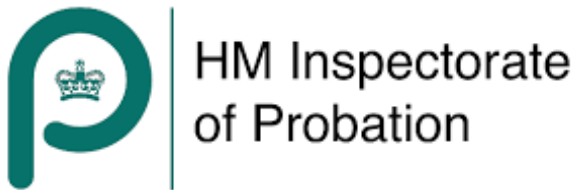

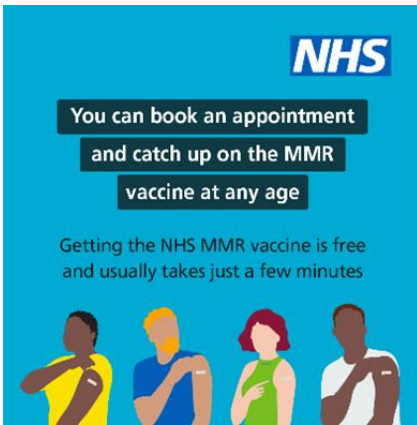
